eScore offers rebates on energy-efficient heat pumps

ot weather usually means higher energy bills, particularly if you cool your home with inefficient airconditioning units or if your heat pump is more than 12 years old. It's probably time to consider purchasing an

energy-efficient electric heat pump, the most economical way to heat and cool your home in West Tennessee's climate.

Ripley Power and Light participates in a TVA program called eScore, which offers incentives for customers to upgrade to an energyefficient heat pump.

The eScore program, for example, offers you ...

■ A \$500 rebate if you upgrade to a dual fuel heat pump. Your unit will cool with electricity, heat your home with electricity and switch to gas when the weather drops to a certain temperature in the winter. To be eligible, you must change your primary heat source from non-electric to electric.

Understanding power surges and why it's smart to have protection

our air conditioner cycling on. Tree limbs falling on power lines. A squirrel touching a transformer. Lightning. Starting your vacuum cleaner.

All of these activities have the potential to create a power surge in your electric service that results in damage to major appliances and sensitive electronic equipment.

That's why Ripley Power and Light offers a two-tier surge protection program.

The first level installs a device at your meter to protect large appliances, such as a refrigerator, stove, washer, dryer, freezer and heating and air-conditioning system. The cost is \$5.95 per month, plus a one-time \$10 installation fee. Both fees will be on your utility bill.

However, to encourage more customers to have surge protection, Ripley Power and Light is waiving the \$10 installation fee for a limited time.

The utility company also is waiving the installation fee for an upgraded surge protection unit on the meters of customers who had units installed between 1999 and 2002.

These units are still working to protect homes, but they are now out of warranty and would no longer cover damages if a direct lightning hit, for example, damaged appliances.

Ripley Power and Light is contacting customers who have these older units to let them know about the upgrade, said Mike Demeris, Energy Services Specialist. However, if you think your unit is out of warranty, you can contact him at mdemeris@ripleypower.com or 731-635-2323.

The utility will continue to contact customers as other

units reach the end of the warranty period, Demeris said.

Ripley Power and Light is waiving the \$10 installation fee for meter-based surge protection for a limited time.

> install without professional help. There is no monthly fee. Power surges occur when the flow of electricity is interrupted, then started again, or when something sends electricity flowing back into the system. Surges can range from five or 10 volts when you turn on your hair dryer to thousands of volts if lightning strikes a transformer.

The 15-year surge protection units starts from the date of manufacture and pays for

damage to white appliances - stoves, refrigerators, central air conditioners, freezers and the like - if a surge caused the damage. There is no deductible.

> Customers' second level of protection is a one-time purchase of plug-in surge protection devices for sensitive electronic equipment, such as computers,

entertainment systems and garage door openers. The purchase can be added to the electric bill at zero interest and is easy to
